# 24 From Totoumi Province to Mikawa Province

Hamana, Arai-cho, Kosai City - JR Futagawa Station, Toyohashi City



Mikawa-no-Kuni (Mikawa Province). At first, Shirasuka Shuku was located at the bottom of Shiomi Slope, but moved at the top owing to the earthquake and the tsunami in 1707 washed away the majority of the houses. Looks of old days remain along the Old Tokaido Road.

### ❶蔵法寺

"Shiomi Kannon" a wooden Kannon, 58 centimeters tall caught in the fisherman's net in The Sea of Enshu (western Shizuoka Prefecture and eastern Aichi Prefecture) in 1654 is enshrined. They say that in 1707, the Kannon appeared in dream of Ikeda Tsunamasa, the lord of Okayama Prefecture and gave him a divine message "This land will have a great earthquake. Leave at once.' when he stayed at Shirasuka honjin. After he got an early start, tsunami came and destroyed Shirasuka Shuku. This Kannon became a Buddhism statue usually kept in a closet to keep an image of the Buddha and shown to public once in 60 years.

#### ❷おんやど白須賀

A hall to exchange and to rest for people stroll in Shirasuka Shuku. They exhibit local historical documents and looks of people travelled at Shiomi Slope.

#### 4 夏目甕麿と加納諸平

Natsume Mikamaro is a scholar of 'kokugaku' (research in ancient Japanese thought and culture through literature) in the latter half of the Edo Period (1603-1868), He studied under Uchiyama Matatsu and wrote "Furuno-no-Wakana" and "Kashu" as a disciple of Motoori Norinaga besides he worked at sake brewery. Morohira, his first son studied medicine under Kano Ichiku who was a physician of the Wakayama feudal clan and was adopted into the Kano family. In his later years Morohira was taken into the leader of kokugaku scholars by the Lord of Kishu (Wakayama Prefecture) and wrote "Todairuidai-Wakasenshu" and "Fukugyokushu".

# Shirasuka Shuku relocated from

the bottom to the top of Shiomi slope, but then they were caught in fire several times because of west wind in winter. So people heaped up mounds on both sides the road and planted evergreen podocarpus, strong against fire to

protect their Such houses. spot existed 3 in Shirasuka Shuku. but now remains only 1.

# 6駒屋

"Komaya (the main Komaya)" thrived as a pawnshop so they opened Higashi-Komaya and Nishi-Komaya, 2 branch shops in the same shukuba. The storehouse was built in the middle of the Edo Period (1603-1868) the main house was built at the end of the Edo Period and separated drawing room and tea ceremony room were added in the Taisho Period (1912-1926). All 8 buildings, main house, tea ceremony room. corridor connecting two buildings, separated drawing room, south storehouse, center storehouse, north storehouse and north barn are designated as cultural properties of Toyohashi City.

#### Futagawa Shuku Honiin Museu 77二川宿本陣資料館

The 1st Goto family and the Kurebayashi family undertook from 1793 handed over honjin because they could not reconstruct the building after the fire. The Baba family served as honjin from 1807 until abolition of honjin. Storehouse built between 1716 and 1736, the main house built in 1753 and entrance hall and the main gate built in 1807 are preserved. Honjin remains along the Old Tokaido Road exist only at Futagawa Shuku and
